Message from the Principal

As you walk the halls of Sacajawea Middle School, you may notice signs posted throughout our school representing the **SAC** Way. The **SAC** Way is a mantra we share with students and staff highlighting and repeating what we believe and expect. **S**how Respect, **A**ccept Responsibility and

Commit to Success. As our students and staff share in our learning community, this small phrase helps us to continue to prepare for the future.

Sacajawea has been recognized as an academic leader by the State of Washington. Recently we committed to a few high performing indicators that align with the College Board and ensure our school is developmentally responsive, culturally relevant and socially equitable. The indicators are Fostering Academic Behaviors, Creating an Environment of Learning, Providing Academic Press and Promoting a Culture of Success. Our leadership team uses these indicators to begin our school year and align all of our day-to-day practices with the notion of "Excellence for Everyone".

I am proud of our professional staff as they continue to seek promising teaching strategies, plan purposefully, and lead from the front. As a quick check, we recently pulled our failure rates and compared them with the last four years. I am happy to share that we have the fewest number of failed classes we have had in recent history. Over 88% of our students are passing classes. This reinforces the belief in the SAC Way.

While you read **Sacajawea News You Can Use**, please look for little details that help you to understand what makes our school so special. This month you will notice two small requests from our community to help us to continue to offer a world-class middle school experience:

- 1. **Support the Sacajawea Fund Run** Students were presented detailed Fund Run information outlining our sole fundraiser for the year. The money our students raise during our Fund Run supports clubs, organizations, music, arts, athletics, and more. Every student in our school is a beneficiary of our Fund Run. As an example, money raised last year funded uniforms, our Sacajawea Theatre performance, Talent Show, reward activity days, after-school activities and more. If every student raises \$30.00 in donations we can meet our goal of \$20,000.
- 2. **Benevolence Fund** We have a small Benevolence fund we use to ensure every student eats every day. If students or families are not able to cover the cost of a lunch, we cover the cost and make sure we always feed our students. On Wednesday Oct. 10th all of our 8th graders will take the PSAT 8 test.

Designed for 8^{th} and 9^{th} graders the Preliminary SAT 8/9 assesses the same knowledge and skills as the SAT.

- Emphasis on reasoning alongside a clearer, stronger focus on the knowledge and skills that are most successful for college and career readiness and success.
- Emphasis on the meaning of word in a variety of contexts and how word choice shapes meaning, tone and impact.
- Focus on math that matters most, including problem solving, data analysis, algebra and advanced mathematical concepts.
- Multiple exposure to the PSAT and SAT statistically results in higher and higher scores.

Students will need to bring #2 pencils and a calculator.

A message from our Counselors....

Students miss school for a variety of reasons. However, a day missed means six classes missed. So here are some things that will help when school is missed.

For Parents/guardian:

Contact the school as soon as you know your student will be absent or tardy. This can be through a phone call (24 hour attendance line: 354-5515) day of, or send a note (signed and dated by parents/guardians) with your student explaining the reason for the absence.

If checking a student out mid-day, please call first thing in the morning to help us expedite all the steps involved to check out a student from school. District policy states that you must come in and check out your child, advance calling helps us get you out of here and on your way faster.

For Students:

If ONE day is missed, please talk to each teacher the next day as you move from period to period to gather what you may have missed. DO NOT assume they will just give you what you need. You must ask them.

If 2-3 days are missed please follow the "One day missed" procedure and contact your counselor if you feel you need assistance with finding the time to make up past work while staying up with the current work upon your return.

Upon the third consecutive day missed: please have parents contact the grade level counselor or office to start a homework collection packet. This can be picked up in the office at a preset



MISS SCHOOL - MISS OUT!!

The Consequences are severe and devastating.

Did you know?

- Chronic absence just 18 days a year or approx. 1.5 days a month - increases the chance that your child will not read or master math at the same level as their peers.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance. (Ditching and skipping school in High School!)
- By 6th grade absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a BETTER predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from

determined time (usually the end of the day) by student or any designated person. We can also provide time at school during the day to assist with making up work in our intervention room. We have found that designating time to do make up work speeds up the process and gets students back to speed sooner.

Pre-arranged absences can be set up ahead of time by contacting your grade level counselor or the main office. This might be a vacation, medical procedure or family care. We have a form students can pick up in the office and take around to teachers to inform them of the future missed days and get any work ahead of time that will assist them in staying current while the student is out of school. Contact your grade level counselor to assist with this process.

What can you do:

- 1. Make attendance a priority.
- 2. Talk about the importance of showing up to school everyday. Make that the expectation.
- 3. Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing home work and getting a good night's sleep.
- 4. Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- 5. Don't let your child stay home unless truly sick.
- 6. Stay on top of academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors if necessary Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- 7. Check on your child's attendance to make sure absences aren't piling up. (See the article below on PowerSchool Parent access call us if you need help with passwords and/or log in information.)

Changes to asthma requirements: Starting

this fall, all asthma will be considered a life-threatening health condition. For students who have a diagnosis of asthma, state law requires them to have a signed Asthma Care Plan and Medication Orders on file, updated by a health care provider each year.

All students who have asthma will be required to have an Asthma Care Plan and Medication Orders AND an inhaler at school prior to the first day of school or they will be excluded. Please

contact Becky Doughty, director of Health Services, at 354-7298 with any questions.

RCW 28A.210: Life-threatening health conditions: Prior to attendance at school, each child with a potentially life-threatening health condition shall present a medication or treatment order addressing the condition. A life threatening health condition means a condition that will put the child in danger of death during the school day if a medication or treatment order is not in place. Needing to keep asthma medications at school is considered a potentially life threatening health condition.

Please check your students grades this week. Call us if you need help logging on. Throughout the year you can use PowerSchool to check grades and attendance. You can even set PowerSchool to email you real time progress reports on a daily or weekly basis to help you stay connected to what is happening at school.

If you have questions about your child's grade, your first step is to contact the teacher directly as soon as you have a concern so they can partner with you to help your child be successful.
